Chairman's Column

There are many people who have suffered disappointments because events have had to be cancelled due to the coronavirus lockdown. Weddings, special birthdays and anniversaries and planned holidays have all been postponed or cancelled and there is the very sad situation of only close family members being able to attend funerals. None of us have ever experienced anything like this before and no one has a crystal ball to predict if, and when, things will get back to normal. I know from my conversations with WIs that you are doing what you can to help one another and particularly consider those who are living alone who may need shopping, collection of prescriptions or just a friendly phone call.

Thank you to everyone who has sent in details of things happening in their own towns and villages. We will try to include as much as possible in the Newsletters. Distribution of the Newsletter has been straightforward enough for those with email addresses and I know many of you have found ways of ensuring that hard copies reach members without email access, even if this has meant buying extra stamps to post them. I deliver a few of the Newsletters to Tydd members as part of my daily walk. The last time a usual half hour walk extended to over 2 hours, as I met and spoke to so many people en route — at a safe distance, of course!

Of a possible total of 41 votes regarding the proposed change to become a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, 32 were received and all were in favour of the change. NFWI has been notified and advised me that we should continue with the process even though the decision cannot be ratified in the usual way at an Annual meeting of NFWI. Our Solicitors have been informed and we are now in their hands with regard to timescale. This may have to be extended due to the current situation but at least we are moving in the right direction.

At the moment we are not advertising any planned forthcoming Federation events. Everything remains 'on hold' until we receive further government guidance on the holding of meetings. Now that we have an email contact for every WI, we will be able to get in touch quickly when the situation changes.

I started by mentioning disappointment at events being cancelled. As I write, I should have been heading to London to attend a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace. I heard from NFWI several months ago that I was one of the lucky Chairmen whose names had been drawn out of a hat to represent the WI this year. Like everything else, the event has been cancelled. I just hope that I will be able to go next year instead.

Easy Cheesy Biscuits.

Equal amounts of butter (or pastry marg.) Plain Flour and a good strong cheddar.

- 1. Pre-heat oven 1800 C if a fan oven (gas mark 6)
- 2. Finely grate the cheese into a mixing bowl.
- 3. Add the other ingredients.
- 4. Mix to a sticky dough.
- 5. Chill for at least half an hour.
- 6. Roll out on a very well-floured surface to approx. 2mm (1/16").
- 7. Cut to desired shape
- 8. Bake on a tray using baking parchment until golden brown (approx. 8 minutes).

The biscuits can be frozen after stage 7 and cooked from frozen, allow an extra couple of minutes baking time.
